Sunday's win felt like a really good step for this team to take, and what our process is built towards, but we have to build on these results

e absolutely merited the win at Old Trafford, and it was great to finally win there in the league for the first time in 14 years.

Before the game I said to my players 'please, let's be who we are today and play with our identity and style'.

And I was so pleased that we were able to do that.

Manchester United are a difficult opponent, but we played how we wanted from the first minute, showed our quality and overall we deserved to win the game.

We were controlling the game well in the first half, but as long as it stayed goalless, I have to admit that what happened against Leicester came back through my mind. Against Leicester we also dominated the first half, and in the second half we couldn't find a way to win the game. But at the weekend we got it done and we looked very mature. The way we manage the last few minutes of games is getting better and better. We have people coming off the bench who really help the team, and individually the players who were required at that stage had a great game.

There were good performances across the park and I'm really pleased with the way our new players have settled in so quickly. They play with a lot of maturity and look like they've been here much longer than they have. Don't forget Thomas and Gabriel are completely new to this league.

Honestly I didn't expect this level from them so soon because I know how tough this league is — you cannot compare it to any other league in the world. But we try to pick certain characteristics in the profile of players that we want to find for our club. Then we want to minimise the risk by looking and looking and making sure that they can contribute to what we're trying to do.

I know that there are still some connections and units where they don't have that flow, because they haven't played much together. I can see that. But also I can see the spirit we are creating and the personality that they are showing on the pitch.

Then you've got players like Mo who have been away from the team for a year but he deserves a lot of credit too.

What Mo transmits to the team is special. He has this energy as a person. He goes in the room and he creates a positive atmosphere. I said to him that we needed that energy and positive feeling that he brings all the time. He was tremendous.

But I must say that everybody's ready for the show at the moment and that's how we want to keep it.

We knew the importance of the game on Sunday, we knew we hadn't won there for a while and we also know you have to beat the top teams if you want to be fighting with them. It's something we haven't been able to do in the last few years, especially away from home. We have to improve on that. There is that gap and we have to make it as small as possible, as quickly as possible. That's the challenge we are facing.

To be fair, this season we've already been to Anfield – and we took them on face to face, then we went to the Etihad and we didn't accept to lose the game there. Then at Old Trafford we did the same, except this time we won.

For us now we want to take this on and be consistent, and show the same desire and hunger tonight.

Results like Sunday's generate belief in the squad and it binds everyone together. We want to continue our good form tonight against Molde in the Europa League.

Everyone is going to feel really part of it because players who haven't played so many minutes in the Premier League until recently will be involved. The fixtures are crazy at the moment and the physical demands are huge. Everybody has to be contributing and focused on what they are bringing to the team. That's the question you have to ask of yourself. It's not just on the pitch, it's off it as well and in training. We're looking at what you can bring to the team, how you can help and how you are contributing. I'm really happy with the team and we have another chance to prove we are up for the fight and up for the challenge tonight.

There is a huge incentive – a win will take us clear at the top of the group and closer to the knock out stages, so let's go for it.

My last notes were just after we'd lost to Leicester. I'm writing these two days after another 1-0 away win – and a very special one for us!

e are all feeling a lot better after that win on Sunday, and we have to say that everybody on the pitch contributed to the win.

Not just the guys on the pitch at the start, but also the guys who came on from the bench, and also the support we had from everybody on the side. It was a good game and good performance from everyone — you could see how happy we all were afterwards.

l enjoyed my goal too, of course I did! It's funny because I play video games a lot with my friends, and whenever I beat them that's the dance I do. They are always like 'oh no, why are you doing that dance?'

So I just wanted to pay tribute to them when I scored,



so they would have seen that and known what it was about. It's a nice dance!

As I said it was a great performance from the whole team, and it was great to see Thomas Partey play like that even though he's not been here long.


Off the pitch he is a really humble guy and you can see that on the pitch as well because he really gives everything in the game. He is really simple and quiet, so humble, and we all really like him. He's really funny too – sometimes he'll do some jokes and we won't be expecting it. So he's settled in really quickly.

On the pitch his strengths are his energy and the way he can stop counter attacks and dangerous situations. That's really important for us. I think he locked down three of Manchester United's midfielders on Sunday – that's my point of view anyway – and that's really important for us.

Also he can play forward really well when he regains the ball and that's a good point for us.

It was also a fantastic performance in midfield from Mo Elneny. I think his loan spell was good for him — to go out and get some more experience. He came back with that experience and that's really important too. How he's been playing since he came back is just unbelievable.

I don't know if you saw the video on Instagram of his sprint at the end of the game? I don't know how he did that! That is the energy he has, that's what we want as a



team and everyone here really wants to play that way. We want to give everything, in every minute and that's exactly what Mo is doing.

He's a funny guy Mo, and I think we are similar people. We are both always smiling and being positive, so when we get together it's always funny – we laugh a lot. It's really, really nice to be around him.

We have got a lot of games at the moment, and we are back at the Emirates tonight in the Europa League. We have a lot of players in the squad this season and I think everyone will get the chance to play games.

We know that with all these games there are concerns about injuries and I think everybody is ready for action when they are needed.

We saw the young boys do well in the last game in the Europa League against Dundalk. They are ready. They showed that in that game. That's why we are doing well – because everybody is preparing properly and ready when needed.

Flo Balogun was one of those who came on in the last game. He is very, very talented, for sure, and he shows every time he plays with us that he is a really great talent. He works hard and is a humble guy as well. I love his

style - he's like an America rapper - he's cool!

We get on well, I don't see him that much, but when he trains with us we have a laugh, with Laca as well.

Maybe I am a mentor now to these younger players, when they watch me training or in the games. I will always try to advise them when I can, but I'm a guy who likes to do jokes first!

But of course if I can give any words to them that will help them, I will always do that. It's nice to be a mentor, because before I was in their place and now I'm older, I think the most important thing is to show an example on the pitch.

It's not about talking all the time, it's about showing what you can do on the pitch, what you can do in training. They just have to see that, put that in their bags, and play their game.



We play Molde tonight, and I have played against Norwegian sides before so I know their style of play. We will study Molde closely before the game but we expect they will come here and go for the three points.

Europa League games can be very different to the Premier League but we have done well in our first two and I'm confident we can play well to beat them.

I know they have a Nigerian centre forward, Leke James, and we see an African influence growing in Europe more and more. I think we've had great examples of African players doing well in Europe before — players like Eto'o and Drogba — and that has inspired African strikers across Europe and everywhere.

Finally, starting today there is another lockdown in England and I find myself saying the same things I did in March. We have to stay safe first of all, take care of each other. The most important thing is the health of everybody. So let's take care, support everybody and remember to do the important things. Wash your hands and wear your mask when you go out places. It's going to be another difficult time but we must stay positive. It's like a fight, where we have to all help each other to win this fight. I'm sure we will come back to normal life very soon. I'm positive, and hopefully this lockdown will not be so long.

UEFA RULES REMINDERS

ideo Assistant Referees are not being used in the Europa League group stages. However, Uefa have decided that VAR will be used in the knockout stages, which are scheduled to start on February 18, 2021.

Another difference between European and domestic games relates to substitutes. Teams can use five substitutes in Europa League games, drawn from 12 players on the bench. The situation in the Premier League is of course three substitutions from seven substitutes.

Tonight's two participants are making the early running to qualify from Group B – let's hope the Gunners can maintain their position at the top of the table.

The criteria to decide who qualifies from the group follow the same format as previous seasons:

- · Points total
- Goal difference
- · Goals scored
- · Away goals scored

If teams still can't be separated, the above four criteria will apply exclusively to the matches between the remaining teams to determine final rankings.

The top two teams will qualify for the two-legged knockout stages. The Round of 32 will take place between the 12 Europa League group-winners and the four best third-placed teams from the Champions League group stage, drawn against the 12 Europa League group runners-up and the remaining third-placed teams from the Champions League group stage

- The winners and runners-up of the same group cannot be drawn against each other.
- Teams from the same association can't be drawn against each other
- The UEFA Europa League group winners and the four best third-placed teams from the UEFA Champions League group stage play the return leg at home

Furthermore, from the Round of 16 onwards, teams from the same association can be drawn against each other.

OUR 99TH PROBLEM

Molde tonight become the 99th different side to play us at Emirates Stadium. Aston Villa were our first ever opponents for an official game, back on August 19, 2006 a match that ended 1-1 thanks to Gilberto's equaliser. Dinamo Zagreb then became our first opponents in European competition four days later - a game we won 2-1 with Freddie Ljungberg and Mathieu Flamini on the scoresheet. In total there have been 395 matches at our home, against 98 different teams.


Tottenham have played here most often (18 times) with Liverpool (17) second.

Of the 98 visiting sides, 48 have faced us in domestic competition, while we have played teams from 22 countries in European competition.

Molde are the first Norwegian side to play here.

We have beaten all but 10 of the 98 opponents at least once - we have recorded most victories against West Ham and Newcastle (12 each) and scored most goals against Tottenham (42).

Rapid Vienna will become the 100th different opposition when they visit early next month.

Arsenal's **1-o win at Old Trafford** on Sunday was a significant result for the Gunners in many ways — not least the narrow margin of the victory. Did you know that...

• 1-o has been the scoreline in our **last six** league wins at Old Trafford:

Nov 1, 2020 Man Utd o Arsenal 1 (Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang)

Sept 17, 2006 Man Utd o Arsenal 1 (Emmanuel Adebayor)

- The win in 1998 was **Arsène Wenger's first** victory at Old Trafford and the victory at Old Trafford in 2002 famously clinched us the league
- Prior to 1985, the previous 1-0 win was back in 1925 – when Jimmy Brain scored in what was only the great Herbert Chapman's third match as Arsenal manager and first away from Highbury
- Before 1925 we also beat Man United 1-0 on **February 29, 1920** — when Jock Rutherford earned us our **first win** against United since our move **'north of the river'**
- And even further back... the Gunners' very first away win against United (then Newton Heath) in the league came on March 15, 1902. The score you guessed it 1-o (Walter Anderson)

In all, we have **won 16** league games at Old Trafford in our history, **nine** of them by a 1-o scoreline – a hefty **56%**.

Although a solicitor by profession, his life revolved around football and he still officiated at the occasional game beyond the age of 8o.



He is survived by his former wife Ruth, son Danny, daughter Emma, four grandchildren and long-time partner Michele, to all of whom we extend our condolences.





y love for football started at a very young age. Growing up, I had my brother to go out and play football with and that's how it all started really that's my earliest memory of football. But in Norway most kids start by playing futsal, rather than football, because it's so cold in the winter and it becomes difficult to play outside.

That's still quite interesting to me because I feel like playing futsal at a really young age has shaped me into the player that I am today. When you play futsal, it's all about having fun and playing in a very technical way. It's about dribbles, quick combination play and scoring crazy goals, and I've always loved that. Back then, the result wasn't too important. The most important thing for all of us as kids was nutmegging or rainbow flicking someone!

When I was 12, I started playing for my first academy and it was for the biggest team in my city. As a kid, I was always playing for the age group above me and I even used to join in with my brother's team (they were three years older). For as long as I can remember, my head has always been focused on football. Sometimes I used to go to school and

bring no books in my backpack, only a football and some spare trainers so I could play during break!

The next few years of my career between the ages of 16 and 19 were quite interesting. I was dropped by my academy and then picked up by a club who were in the championship. I joined their reserve squad and things started going really well for me, and then just a year later I was called up to the first-team when I was 17. I was really young and considered an emerging talent at the club, so I was expecting to get a lot of minutes and that I'd be able to make my mark - but things happened and I found myself on the bench for most of the season. That was really tough for me, so I eventually chose to leave the club for an opportunity elsewhere. All I wanted to do was play.

I took a step down to the second division and joined a senior team there, but despite feeling like I put in some really good performances, I found myself on the bench for the second half of the season. Again, it was really tough for me, but I was brave and never let that impact me. I was just trying to remain focused. In the end I went back to my home

city and there was a newly-promoted team called Fløya who wanted me on a trial. They were about to play in the Norwegian third tier and they invited me to a tournament called the iTromsø Cup. To cut a long story short, I finished as top scorer and that's when my journey to Arsenal started. As a team, we played far better than many people expected and I was really happy with my performances, so I thought 'Okay, maybe now it will be easier for me to find a club here

and I can kickstart my career with some game time' - but then I received a call that I'll never, ever forget.

My agent had been speaking to a few clubs after the tournament and he said 'George, you won't believe this ... Arsenal want you for a trial'. In that moment, I lost my head. I didn't know how to react. I genuinely thought he was joking and I asked him to promise me that it's true about five

times! It was a dream come true and from there. I did everything I could to make sure that I was ready to come to north London and impress. Being able to tell my family was such a privilege. All of my family are massive Arsenal fans and to be honest, I don't think they believed me! They were joking that it could be an Arsenal C team, but I was like 'No! It's the real Arsenal! | promise!'.

Officially, I've been at the club for just over two months now, and looking back, I'm really happy with the way I've started. I scored against Ipswich in the EFL Trophy and assisted Ben Cottrell against Brighton, but unfortunately I picked up an injury and I've been out for the past month. I just can't wait to get back out there, but on the plus side, it's given me some time to reflect. The other day I was just thinking how I used to watch Ozil, Aubameyang and Lacazette on TV, yet here I am now at Arsenal, training with them! I've trained and grafted so hard over the past few years, so it's amazing to get little rewards and experiences like this. It's something I'll remember for the rest of my life, but right now, I'm focused on having more days like that.

Catching up with former Arsenal Academy players as they continue their pro careers away from Emirates

HAVARD NORDTVEIT

navard Nordtveit tells a story about when Arsène Wenger arrived in Vats in north Norway to secure the services of the 16 year old from Haugesund – recalling that the entire village came out on the streets to try and catch a glimpse of the famous Monsieur Wenger. His move to the Gunners was certainly big news in Norway as the best young defender of his generation headed to one of Europe's elite clubs.

In his first season, 2007/2008, he was named on the substitutes' bench for the final Premier League game of the season, against Sunderland, but wasn't called upon

- and that was the closest he came to gracing the Gunners first team. He made numerous under-23 and reserve team appearances over subsequent years, but never quite managed to take that final step into the first-team. He also enjoyed loan spells at Salamanca in Spain, Lillestrom in his homeland and FC Nurnberg in Germany before – after three and a half years at Emirates - he headed to Borussia Monchengladbach on a permanent transfer.

Havard flourished in Germany, playing 187 games and scoring 12 goals over six seasons. In fact, his form was so good - playing primarily as a defensive midfielder – that he was even linked with a big money move back to Arsenal!

On May 16, 2016, Havard was back in London, signing a five-year contract with West Ham but after a disappointing season in which he played just 21 times, he was back in Germany, this time to Hoffenheim where he has played 46 times over three seasons, though he did spend the last half of the 2018/19 season back in

A regular for his country – and capped at every youth level – Havard has 52 full caps for Norway and has scored twice.








It's quite difficult to answer, to be honest, because there are so many things in my head. This is something that I've always missed in my life and it's hard because I've missed so many special days and moments with my family because of football. I'm looking forward to the day I can wake up and spend time with my family without worrying about when I need to leave or get ready for something.


What do you still want to achieve away from football?



Only two Norwegian teams have previously taken on the Gunners – and only one player from Norway has featured for Arsenal's first team

EUROPEAN CUP FIRST ROUND Stromsgodset 1-3 Arsenal (1st leg – Sept 15, 1971) Arsenal 4-o Stromsgodset (2nd leg – Sept 29, 1971)

he Gunners' 7-1 aggregate victory over the Norwegian part timers doesn't do justice to the fascinating story behind this tie.

This was Arsenal's first ever European Cup tie, after they qualified having won the League and FA Cup 'double' the season before. Bertie Mee's men travelled to Oslo on September 15 and won comfortably (in the end) thanks to an early goal by Peter Simpson, a beautiful curled effort from Scottish winger Peter Marinello, and a 20-yard drive from midfielder Eddie Kelly. But after Arsenal went 2-0 up, Steinar Pettersen reduced the deficit, and roared on by a passionate home crowd, Pettersen hit Gunners goalkeeper

Bob Wilson's post with a great shot. Like Arsenal, Stromsgodset had completed the league and cup 'double' in the previous campaign after a titanic tussle with Rosenborg, managed by former Gunners player from the 1930s, George Curtis.

A decade before, Stromsgodset were mired in the depths of Norway's regional fourth division, but inspirational coach Einar Larsen spearheaded their surge through the Norwegian leagues. Situated in the modest town of Drammen, some 27 miles west of Oslo, Stromsgodset was a multi-sport club with sections for ice hockey, handball and bandy – a winter game played on skis. Several of the football players were also accomplished bandy stars. Like the majority of Norwegian clubs in that era, the players were dubbed 'part time professionals', trained twice a week, and received 100

crowns (£5-£6) for a league win and half that for a draw. For the European Cup clashes with Arsenal, the Drammen based players received double their normal bonuses. The players were an eclectic mix of university students, bank clerks and insurance salesmen with centre back Jan Kristiansen working at a local armaments factory as an explosives expert.

27,146. Arsenal swatted the Norwegians aside with a comfortable 4-o victory, thanks to goals from Ray Kennedy, John Radford (2) and George Armstrong.

Bertie Mee remarked: "Over both legs, their players have proved themselves to be robust and skilled, and with the right coaching, will only improve as time progresses." Within a decade, the Norway national team shocked England 2-1 in Oslo, during a World Cup qualifier.

Reestablished in 2013 after a 20-year break, Stromsgodset IF remarkably won the top flight (Tippeligaen) once more in 2013.

FABULOUS FANS

Norway has an established Arsenal supporters club with a healthy membership of 5,967. Arsenal Norway has been sending groups across the North Sea to north London for decades – until this season of course. A notable Gooner from the country is Erling Kagge, one of the world's great explorers who, in 1994 became the first person to have reached the North Pole, South Pole and summit of Everest.

REMEMBER... PAL LYDERSEN

Pal Lydersen holds the distinction of being the only Norwegian to make a firstteam appearance for Arsenal.

The versatile IK Start full back was signed for Arsenal by George Graham in November 1991 as cover for both Lee Dixon and Nigel Winterburn. Lydersen, who had played at both left back and right back, spoke excitedly about the challenge which awaited him when he arrived in N5: "There are many talented Scandinavians who I feel possess the physical strength and the guile to succeed at the highest level in England."

But ultimately, Lydersen only made 16 starts for the Gunners (setting up a goal for Tony Adams against Nottingham Forest at Highbury in a 3-3 draw in 1991/92), before returning to IK Start on loan for the beginning of the 1993/94 campaign.

Lydersen was correct in his prediction though, as a raft of Scandinavian stars, including John Jensen (Denmark) followed 'Super Swede' Anders Limpar (who'd joined Arsenal in 1990) across the North Sea to the English top flight during the early 1990s.



ollowing a frustrating draw in the Group E clash in Norway on September 29, Arsenal boss Arsène Wenger admitted: "For all our possession and attacking, they (Rosenborg) were phenomenally well organised and kept us at bay."


Freddie Ljungberg pounced early to poke the ball home for Arsenal (whom many bookies had installed as favourites to win the competition) following a corner, but Thierry Henry, Robert Pires and Ljungberg all missed fine chances to put the game out of reach. In the second half, with a 21,000 crowd at the Lerkendal Stadion, roaring their team on, Rosenborg's neat approach work paid dividends. A swift counter attack allowed Oyvind Storflor space down the left and he superbly cut the ball back for Roar Strand to sidefoot firmly beyond the reach of Jens Lehmann and claim his 10th European goal for Rosenborg. Ten out of 11 players (defender Mikael Dorsin was the exception) were Norwegian.

On December 7, in front of a 35,421 Highbury crowd, Arsenal put Rosenborg to the sword as they cruised into the knock out stages of the Champions League. With just three minutes on the clock, Jose Antonio Reyes latched onto a wonderfully weighted Dennis Bergkamp pass to slalom round a defender and slot home the Gunners' first goal. Thierry Henry then capitalised on a defensive error to nudge Arsenal further ahead, and after a spot of ball juggling, Cesc Fabregas gave Arsenal a 3-o lead midway through the first half. Rosenborg hit the post before pulling a goal back on 38 minutes through Erlik Hoftun, much to the delight of their 2,000 fans, many of whom were clad in Viking helmets, before goalkeeper Espun Johnsen's foul on Thierry Henry shorty before half time gave Robert Pires the opportunity to put the Gunners 4-1 up at the break.

Arsenal had several chances to pile on the goals in the second half, but Robin van Persie was the only one to take his chance and give the Gunners an excellent 5-1 win.

The work of The Arsenal Foundation and the partners and initiatives it supports have touched the lives of a great number of people in a variety of ways

The Arsenal Foundation's emergency Covid fund has helped SJOG Hospitaller Services, an international charity that supports the disabled, elderly, homeless and people from religious minorities. Miguel Neves, 53, the charity's national lead for homeless & modern-day slavery/trafficking, tells us about their work

am Portuguese, from Lisbon, and 20 years ago I came to the UK as a migrant looking to restart my life and have new experiences. I have worked in social care since arriving here, including as a home care manager for Islington and a service manager in Camden. In 2015 I joined SJOG at Olallo House, a hostel in central London, and we haven't stopped developing and growing since then.

The Order of St John Of God was founded in Darlington in the 1880s and provides services and housing support for individuals with learning difficulties, mental health issues, the homeless and victims of modern-day slavery and trafficking. When I started with SJOG we supported about 30 people in our homeless services - this has increased to more than 120, not counting victims of trafficking and slavery.

We receive referrals on an almost daily basis, and we have to settle those people in quickly and keep them safe. We didn't see an increase in demand during the first lockdown because the whole homeless population was shielded in hotels, but what we did find was that the ones who were in service couldn't be moved on. That led to a bottleneck where we couldn't accept new individuals because there were no vacancies.

Unfortunately, with the winter looming and respiratory diseases increasing in conjunction with the second wave of Covid, we expect an increase in demand. The lack of spaces is a real issue, especially for those who are most vulnerable because of their age or pre-existing conditions. For us it's about delivering our services in a safe and responsible way.

My proudest moments working here are always when I see someone move on with a job and accommodation - to see individuals regain their independence and leave us with a live future they are happy with and which is long lasting and resilient.

We used the funds from The Arsenal Foundation to buy PPE to protect residents and staff in delivering the services. The money was vital to help us maintain the safety of our residents and colleagues.

Football clubs are important social agents and are able to galvanise their supporters around causes like not many organisations are able to. We all understand that football is a business that moves a great deal of funds and that clubs have to invest in players to stay profitable and visible. But at the same time they are grassroots movements, and as such part of their communities, and must have the willingness to also be a social player and support the organisations that assure the wellbeing and existence of the communities they are part of.

Champions of Norway four times in the last decade, the first of them fittingly in 2011, the year of the club's centenary, Molde Fotballklubb are one of the contemporary heavyweights of Norwegian football together with coastal rivals and record champions Rosenborg. For that they owe a large debt to former player Ole Gunnar Solskjaer, who led them to both that 2011 league title and a successful defence in 2012 as well as a Norwegian Cup triumph in 2013.

It was the man who assisted Solskjaer in his second spell as
Molde manager – from 2015-18 after the current Manchester
United boss's brief and unsuccessful first foray into the Premier League
with Cardiff City – who led them to another Eliteserien title in 2019, Erling
Moe achieving the feat in his first full campaign in the hot seat. It was
a dominant triumph, too, Molde finishing 14 points clear of runners-up
Bodo/Glimt with 21 wins from their 30 matches.

The likelihood is that those roles will be reversed when the 2020 league campaign comes to a close, Bodo/Glimt having opened up a large gap at the top of the table and looking firmly on course for their maiden Norwegian championship crown. Because of the Covidinduced delay to the season, Molde's schedule has been practically non-stop since the Eliteserien kicked off in mid-June, with fixtures to fulfil almost every weekend and midweek.

Since late August the club's midweek dates have been filled with European games. Starting out in the UEFA Champions League first qualifying round, Molde beat Finnish champions KuPS 5-0 at home before overcoming Celje of Slovenia (who had already knocked out Dundalk) 2-1 at the Aker Stadion. They then eliminated Qarabag on penalties after a 0-0 away draw and were excruciatingly close to making it through to the Champions League proper only to be denied in the playoffs by Ferencvaros – not just on away goals but by an extremely harsh handball penalty that enabled the Hungarian side to draw the first leg 3-3 in Norway before holding Molde 0-0 in Budapest.

Molde's disappointment at not making it through to Europe's elite club competition for the second time – their one previous involvement was in 1999/2000 – was immense, but they have made a very positive start to the Europa League group stage, where they are competing for the third time – after 2012/13, when they failed to progress, and 2015/16, when they defied the odds by topping a group containing Ajax, Celtic and Fenerbahce before going out in the round of 32 (0-3 away, 1-0 home) to eventual winners Sevilla. An opening 2-1 win against Dundalk in Dublin two weeks ago was supplemented by last Thursday's 1-0 home success against Rapid Vienna, so they visit Emirates Stadium with maximum points, plenty of confidence and genuine aspirations of extending an already lengthy European campaign into the spring of 2021.

THE SKIPPER MAGNUS WOLFF EIKREM MIDFIELDER

Born Molde, Norway, 8/8/90

Previously Man United, Molde, Heerenveen, Cardiff, Malmo, Seattle Sounders

The main man in the Molde midfield, Magnus is the central conductor of the team's play as well as a key figure at corners and free kicks. He is also the club captain and the proud owner of three Eliteserien championship-winning medals, the first two won under Ole Gunnar Solskjaer, who took him to Cardiff City in 2014. Having started his career with Manchester United's youth teams, the 30 year old has also played in the Netherlands, Sweden and the USA.





THE STALWART EIRIK HESTAD MIDFIELDER

BORN Aureosen, Norway, 26/6/95 PREVIOUSLY None

A former Norway youth international, attacking midfielder Eirik has spent his entire career to date with Molde, becoming a regular starter over the past five years and fast closing in on his 200th appearance for the club. He had a particularly prolific scoring run in the 2018/19 Europa League qualifying phase, hitting seven goals in seven games, and was Molde's first scorer in Europe this season with the opener in the first qualifying round win against KuPS.

PREVIOUSLY Holmila, Lillestrom, Jerv, Stabaek

Once renowned as the youngest player ever to score in Norway's top flight – for Lillestrom in 2010 aged 16 years and 300 days – Ohi has developed into one of the most feared strikers in the Eliteserien. He netted 17 league goals for Stabaek in 2017 and two years later, in his debut campaign for Molde, struck 15 times to help his new club win the league title. The 26 year old has also found the net in both Group B matches against Dundalk and





THE NO-NONSENSE DEFENDER MARTIN BJORNBAK DEFENDER

BORN Mo i Rana, Norway, 22/3/92 PREVIOUSLY Stalkameratene, Bodo/Glimt, Haugesund, Bodo/Glimt

Tall, long-haired and physically imposing, Martin is a rock-solid central defender who joined Molde at the start of the 2019 season and was a key performer in the club's title win, starting 25 of their 30 matches. His title triumph came just two years after he won promotion with Bodo/Glimt to the Eliteserien. On the sidelines with an injury in August and September this year, he gave an eye-catching performance on Europa League Matchday 1 against Dundalk.





RETWEEN THE POSTS ANDREAS LINDE SDAIKFEPER

BORN Helsingborg, Sweden, 24/7/93

PREVIOUSLY Helsingborg, Varnamo (loan), Akademi (loan)

A Molde player since 2015, Swedish keeper Andreas has been the club's first choice between the posts for the past four years, though he missed a large segment of the 2019 Eliteserien triumph through injury. The 27 year old has been immovable in 2020, however, and has played every minute of the club's European campaign so far this season, keeping four clean sheets in seven games. Capped once by Sweden at senior level, he represented his country at the 2016 Olympics in Rio.

ARCTIG MAN MARCUS HOLMGREN PEDERSEN DEFENDER

BORN Hammerfest, Norway, 16/7/00 PREVIOUSLY Tromso

A celebrated native of Hammerfest, reputedly the northernmost town of 10,000-plus inhabitants in the world, Martin began his career in the Arctic Circle with Tromso, playing 20 matches in the Eliteserien for the club before, still aged 19, he joined Molde in February this year. An attacking right-back who likes to shoot at goal, he is a current Norway Under-21 international having already represented his country at the 2019 European Under-19 Championship in Armenia.





HE SWEET LEFT FOOT TZAZ HUSSAIN IIDFIELDER

BORN Oslo, Norway, 27/1/93

PREVIOUSLY Fredrikstad, Molde, Sivasspor, Rudes, Odd (loan)

Born in Oslo of Pakistani descent, Etzaz spent two years at Manchester United's academy before making a name for himself in his homeland over two spells with Molde that were interrupted by stints in Turkey and Croatia. A Norway youth international with 46 European club appearances under his belt, the left-footer has won three league titles with Molde although 2020 has arguably been his strongest year yet.





HE MARKSMAN EKE JAMES TTACKER

BORN Kaduna, Nigeria, 1/11/92

PREVIOUSLY Bridge Boys, Aalesund, Beijing Enterprises

An accomplished Nigerian striker who first made his name in Norway with Aalesund, for whom he scored 45 goals in 101 appearances, Leke arrived at Molde in April 2018 after a couple of years in China and was their top scorer in the following year's domestic title triumph, scoring 17 goals in the league and 24 in all competitions. The 28 year old has continued to score freely in 2020 though missed most of October through injury.



THE BOSS Erling Moe

BORN July 22, 1970 in Molde, Norway PREVIOUSLY Kristiansund (2011), Molde (2015)

Following in the footsteps of a club legend is no easy task, but Erling Moe has done a remarkable job since he replaced Ole Gunnar Solskjaer as Molde head coach, initially as a caretaker, when the ex-Manchester United striker replaced Jose Mourinho as manager in December 2018. Under the Molde-born Moe the team romped to the 2019 Norwegian title, and although there is unlikely to be a repeat in 2020, the new man in charge came very close to achieving Champions League qualification before joing Europa League Group B, where his side have made a perfect start.

OWL FLIES BACK IN

One member of the Molde coaching staff has some good memories about the Gunners. Current Analysis Manager Petter Rudi played for Sheffield Wednesday between 1997 and 2000 and played three games against Arsenal, 2-0 and 1-0 wins at Hillsborough in season's 1997/98 and 1998/99 and a 3-0 defeat at Highbury in the latter season. STRANDE AND STRAND

Currently first-team coach Trond Strande is a Molde legend, sitting seventh on their all-time appearance charts with 238 games across 16 seasons. Roar Strand on the other hand will be remembered by Arsenal fans as the striker who equalised against Arsenal for Rosenborg in Norway in 2004 and Roar also had a season at Molde as a young player in 1993. Strand scored in a remarkable 21 consecutive seasons in the Norwegian top flight - his other 20 with Rosenborg. This matches Ryan Giggs European record, though both Pele and Romario jointly hold the world record of 23 seasons!





SCOUTING REPORT

fter two matches of Group B, the situation is clear -Arsenal and Molde have two wins apiece, while Rapid Vienna and Dundalk are yet to get off the mark. The Norwegian side are evidently the strongest opposition Arsenal will face in this season's group stage. and may cause the Gunners problems with their speedy attacking into wide positions.

Manager Erling Moe – a lifelong Coventry City fan – was previously Ole Gunnar Solskjaer's assistant at Molde, before succeeding him when Solskjaer departed to take charge of Manchester United two years ago. Thus far, kept things simple and consistent, favouring a 4-2-3-1

Moe's biggest challenge over the course of 2020 has been injuries, particularly in defensive positions. The entire back four has been out at some stage this season, with the long-term absence of right back Kristoffer Haraldseid a

particular problem. Moe has compensated for his absence by rotating youngster Marcus Pederson and American midfielder Henry Wingo.

In the centre, Martin Bjornbak and Stian Rode Gregersen have a reliable partnership, while left back Kristoffer Haugen is capable of pushing forward on the overlap. Molde might start this game relatively cautiously, but at their best their combinations down the flanks can open up

Moe likes to keep things solid in the centre of the pitch, usually fielding a steady combination of Etatz Hussain and Fredrik Aursnes in front of the defence. This allows captain Magnus Wolff Eikrem the freedom to push forward into attack. His career has been closely linked to that of Solskjaer - he was originally spotted by Molde as a teenager at one of Solskiaer's soccer schools, spent five years at Manchester United where Solskjaer was reserve manager, and then played under him in two more stints at Molde and another at Cardiff City. Moe made him captain at the start of this season, and on his day, Eikrem is capable of dominating games in midfield and then pushing forward to provide goals and assists in the final third.

Out wide, Eirik Hestad is a reliable operator and combines well with an overlapping full back, while down the left Moe has used both Mathis Bolly, a speedy but not particularly prolific Ivory Coast international, or Ola Brynhildsen, a youngster who arrived in the summer. Again, he combines well with Haugen, as Molde look to work the ball into crossing situations.

Up front, Nigerian striker Leke James was the star of Molde's 2019 success, scoring 17 goals, although has been less prolific this season and has been working his way back from injury. That means Moe has instead turned to another player of Nigerian descent, Ohi Omoijuanfo, who has led the line so far in the Europa League, scoring the winner in the 2-1 victory over Dundalk and the only goal in the 1-0 win over Rapid Vienna last week. Both are good allround strikers, but Moe is unlikely to start them both together at the Emirates, in what is likely to be a defensive approach from the Norwegian side.





JOE WILLOCK IN HIS OWN WORDS

Our young midfielder is determined to make this a big season as he looks to establish himself further in the first team

s you can see in our squad, there's so much competition right now and there are so many players who are fighting for a spot in the starting XI - and even the bench - so it's really important to keep your mind right and your body fit.

I've tried to take things up a level this season by paying closer attention to my diet and the finer details because it can make such a vital difference at the top. I hired a new chef over the summer, and she's got me eating really well. It's so helpful for me because not only are all my meals structured and planned out in advance to help me with training and match days, but it also gives me time to focus and impressive other areas of my game too. It's only a small change, but sometimes the smallest of changes can make a big difference.

At the tail end of last season, I also started writing in a journal on the night before every game. I thought I'd give it a try and see how it goes, and this season I've really started doing it properly. It could be anything in there! Sometimes I'll write down that I want to score a goal or make five tackles, and other times I'll write down Mikel's instructions or game plan in detail. It all started because I was speaking to some of the other boys and they said that they've been implementing some other similar ideas, so I thought why not give it a try? It's something that's really good for my own mental state because it allows me to set a target, think about it and become familiar with it, and when I'm out on the pitch it really sticks out in my mind. A few have come true already!

I feel like I've really improved my mindset over the past year too. When I'm not playing well or I'm not in the squad, of course it bothers me, but it's all about how you react and how you approach the next day. I'll never stop working hard for opportunities at this club and I'll always persevere to the end.

I feel like that mentality and focus has helped me a lot this season, and when I think back to my first ever training session with the first team. I really believe I've come on in leaps and bounds - both on and off the pitch. I feel like I'm so much smarter on the pitch in my movements and positioning, and I also feel like I'm a better professional





than I ever was before. I put a lot of that down to the manager because ever since he's come in, he's been so precise with everything that he's telling me, and I really appreciate that. I like to have clarification on what people want from me and when I'm given that, I feel like I can be the best version of myself. I can't wait to get some more opportunities and show the fans just how much I've improved under Mikel.

But, of course, I've got a new midfielder to compete with in Thomas Partey, now. We've played Atletico Madrid in a number of ties over the years, so I've seen Thomas in action a few times and I'm a big fan of his. When he arrived at the club, I thought I'd take a moment to tell him just how much I like his style of play and that I'm really looking forward to combining with him. He's a brilliant addition

Speaking to the lads in the dressing room before he joined, they were all saving that he's such a strong midfielder, but he's so technical too. He's a player that we needed. He can break up play, dish balls out at speed and keep possession ticking over, so he's a really good signing and we've seen that in all of our training sessions so far.

I'm just so excited to be given opportunities under Mikel after all the work that we've been doing on the training ground, and with players like Partey joining the club, I'm even more excited to get out there. He's someone that I can learn from as a younger player in the team.

I'd also like to take a moment to congratulate Bukayo and Ainsley on making their debuts for England last month. Having seen both of them grow up through the academy here at Arsenal, it was amazing to see them get the rewards for their hard work. From the moment I first played with Bukayo in the academy, I knew he was going to go far and never doubted that he could prove himself in the first team.

He's such a talented player, but above all else, his mindset, attitude and work rate is spot on. He's already leading by example. As for Ainsley, he's had some difficult moments where things weren't quite going right for him, but he persevered, came through the other side and received his call-up - and that's something that really inspires me to keep working harder.

I'm feeling really strong and mature on the pitch at the moment, so I'm really hoping that I can get out on the pitch and show the results of all my hard work as often as possible. I thought I did well against Dundalk last week, contributed with a fair amount. That's what I want to do, I want to score goals, create goals and to get an assist and a goal, I'm really happy to do that. I just want to push on and do it more in the Premier League. I obviously loved scoring. The ball dropped to me kind of fast but I stayed composed, I looked at the keeper and I slotted it in. I've been working on it in training so I'm happy it paid off that day.

When I look back at my performances, I'm no longer seeing an academy player who's playing within himself or looking nervous. I think I look mature out there and settled on the ball, and that's a really big step to make when you're a young player trying to prove your worth. Now, I just need to keep working hard to make sure I'm ready for any opportunity that's handed my way.

ur Europa League clash with Dundalk handed our frontline the opportunity to state the starting berth in Mikel Arteta's side - but it was midfielder Joe Willock who made the loudest claim.

The 21 year old posed a constant threat in the final third with his movement, providing a goal and an assist, yet it was his general play and exceptional work-rate that stood out most.


Starting alongside Mohammed Elneny, the Egyptian was responsible for anchoring our midfield and dictating play from deep, while Joe was given greater freedom to push forward and play between the lines.

During our comfortable 3-0 win, the England youth international made three key passes, more than any other player on the pitch, and finished the match with a pass completion rate of 91.1 per cent.

He also registered a total of 86 touches (2nd) and contested for 14 duels (1st).

It's worth noting that Willock lost possession more than any other player too (20) - but this comes with the responsibility of being our only attack-minded midfielder in the starting XI. Not to mention that his response to losing the ball was always positive, racing back at breakneck speed to regain possession.
